"Women and the Book"

Half a century ago, women were mostly absent from history books. However, over the past decades, an explosion of research has reintegrated the voices of women in the history of the Middle Ages and Renaissance. Manuscripts made and/or owned by women offer one of the best and most vivid resources for telling the stories of these women, secular and religious, young and old, high-born and common. Seven of the manuscripts in our new list were owned by, and often made by, nuns. The lives of secular women are revealed in three special manuscripts, an illuminated manuscript owned by a well-born Renaissance woman in France, one including a text (by a man) discussing women and fashion in Renaissance Florence, and an intriguing liturgical manuscript that also includes cosmetic recipes. For the classroom and the collector, these manuscripts bring to life the roles women played in society – as readers, scribes, agents, artists – and often give voice to their emotions, thoughts, fears, and desires.

Psalter (Premonstratensian use)

In Latin, illuminated manuscript on parchment, with (added) musical notation

Northwestern Germany (diocese of Cologne),

c. 1270-1280

EARLY, DIMINUTIVE, ILLUMINATED, USED BY NUNS

DESCRIPTION: 270 folios on parchment, complete, occasional flaking of the initials, overall excellent condition, bound in 16th-century blind-tooled calf. Dimensions 103 x 75 mm.

Charming example of an illuminated liturgical Psalter, certainly owned by women in the seventeenth century, and perhaps made for Premonstratensian nuns. This small volume, still in a fine early binding, includes an initial of David playing his harp painted in an

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elegant style close to that of the Cologne illuminator Johannes von Valkenburg, known for two Graduals completed in 1299. It includes musical notation added in the fourteenth century in the characteristically German Hufnagelschrift and bears a distinguished modern provenance. [TM 1020]

Processional (Dominican Use)

In Latin, illuminated manuscript on parchment with musical notation

France (Poissy), c. 1330-1350; additions c. 1500-1520(?)

TWO IN ONE: FOR AND BY NUNS, FROM TWO DIFFERENT CENTURIES

DESCRIPTION: 66 folios on parchment, missing leaves following f. 40, twenty illuminated initials, slightly trimmed but very good condition, bound in 18th-century gold-tooled leather. Dimensions 150 x 95 mm.

Many Processionals were made for the use of nuns. Those from the convent of St.-Louis at Poissy, home to sisters of royalty



and the author Christine de Pizan, are among the best known. This example is fascinating. It joins part of an early manuscript from Poissy (only seven other Poissy Processionals pre-date 1400) with a sixteenth-century section likely undertaken by a nun at Poissy. The female scribe-illuminator imitated the style of early Poissy Processionals, paying conscious tribute to the past of the convent, an act that brings to life the creative process that inspired this woman. Augustinian Missal (use of Rome)

In Latin, decorated manuscript on parchment with musical notation Northern Italy (Lombardy?), c. 1450-1470

INTERESTING FORMAT (SMALL FOR A MISSAL), USED BY FRANCISCAN NUNS

DESCRIPTION: 271 folios, lacking one folio (Crucifixion miniature), some stains and dampstaining, but in good condition, modern quarter calf and marbled paper, front hinge broken. Dimensions 158 x 115 mm.

Missals are relatively rare survivals, since they were often used until they fell apart. This is an excellent example of an im-

portant sub-genre, the portable mendicant Missal. Made for the use of an Augustinian friar or nun, the manuscript was used by Franciscan nuns near Milan by the end of the fifteenth century, demonstrating how easily an Augustinian liturgical book lent itself for a new life within the Franciscan order. Carefully copied, this small but substantial volume includes twenty pages with musical notation, a noteworthy feature. [TM 1101]

Switzerland (Kloster Töss?), c. 1455-1461

Mystics and Saints: Swiss Dominican nuns

DESCRIPTION: 156 folios, lacking 18 leaves, cadel and attractive penwork initials, water damage first four leaves, some ink fading (text still mostly legible), otherwise very good condition, 19th-century vellum binding. Dimensions 138 x 98 mm.

A small handheld Psalter with musical notation and elaborate cadel initials that introduce the antiphons preceding the psalms.




Certainly for Dominican use, it was likely made by and for Dominican nuns, possibly at the convent of Töss in Switzerland. The convent was founded in the thirteenth century and is famous for the sister-book (Schwesternbuch) by Elsbeth Stagel, chronicling the spiritual lives of the nuns who lived there. This is an attractive Psalter, with an unusually interesting medieval and modern provenance. [TM 1065]

Franciscan Breviary (use of Rome)

In Latin, decorated manuscript on parchment Central Italy, Umbria (Perugia), c. 1456-1470

PARADOX – "PORTABLE" BREVIARY FOR CLOISTERED FRANCISCAN NUNS

DESCRIPTION: 540 folios on parchment, lacking a quire of 10 leaves, penwork initials, some small stains and signs of wear, otherwise very good condition, 15th- or 16th-century blind-tooled calf binding, modern repairs. Dimensions 106 x 82 mm. (text block c. 70 mm. thick).

In its early binding and very small, but very thick (almost as thick as it is wide), this attractive Umbrian Breviary was cop-



ied in a tiny script by a skilled scribe. Although modern historians often think of this type of portable volume as answering the needs of travelling mendicant Friars, this Breviary was owned by a Franciscan nun. An early note identifies her by name: Sister Scholastica. Certainly made for use in the diocese of Perugia, it is possible it was made for the nuns of the prestigious Convent of Sant'Antonio of Padua. **[TM 1057]**

FASHION AND CONFESSION IN FLORENCE

DESCRIPTION: 112 folios on paper, complete, penwork initial, some leaves darkened, stains, but good condition, limp vellum binding reusing a 15th-century Choir book leaf.

Dimensions 165 x 120 mm.

This pocket handbook of confession contains texts to assist the confessor in his practical and daily tasks, notably the popu-



lar manual for confessors named *Confessionale-Defecerunt*. The additional texts that complete the *Confesionale* are also of special interest, including an extract on women's dress codes and an added model of confession in Italian. If the date of 1462 given in two colophons is correct, the present manuscript was assembled only a few years after the death of the author, St. Antoninus of Florence. **[TM 498]**



In French, illuminated manuscript on parchment France, likely Bourges, c. 1500-1510

ILLUMINATION, FEMALE OWNERSHIP, ORIGINAL VELVET BINDING

DESCRIPTION: 63 folios on parchment, complete, full-page miniature, very good condition, contemporary velvet binding, covers worn, hinges fragile. Dimensions 210 x 135 mm.

In its original purple velvet binding and adorned with a frontispiece painted by the Master of Spencer 6, this deluxe, carefully fashioned manuscript presents a unique copy of a French transla-



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tion by a hitherto unknown translator of Saint Jerome's letter to the widow Furia. Owned by a woman of the French aristocracy, Anne de Polignac, who was widowed twice, this manuscript invites us to re-examine her remarkably varied library of some thirty-six manuscripts, most in the vernacular, raising questions pertaining to female book ownership and literary and artistic patronage in the first decades of the sixteenth century, and the nature of the reading experiences of French Renaissance women. In Latin and German, illuminated manuscript on paper with musical notation

Southern or Central Germany, c. 1515-1525

INTRIGUING PARTNERS: LITURGY AND MEDICAL AND COSMETIC RECIPES

DESCRIPTION: 114 folios on paper, complete, illuminated initials, minor stains and smudging, otherwise very good condition, contemporary blind-tooled pigskin binding.

Dimensions 200 x 140 mm.

This handsome manuscript, a perfect size for teaching, features distinctive German musical notation known as Hufnagel



("horseshoe nail"), accomplished illuminated initials in gold leaf, and a fine contemporary blind-tooled binding. Alongside the Latin liturgical texts are texts for the Mass and recipes for make-up in German, opening the possibility of female ownership. An intriguing witness to the religious life in Germany during the early decades of the Reformation, the volume underlines the continuation of medieval traditions of bookmaking well into the age of print. 

DESCRIPTION: 287 folios on paper, complete, penwork initials, good condition, early (original?) blind-tooled leather binding. Dimensions 110 x 85 mm.

This small volume is the personal Prayer Book of an individual nun, a member of a convent in eastern Swabia and shows evi-

Processional (Dominican use)

In Latin and French, illuminated manuscript on parchment France (Rouen), c. 1520-1530; c. 1525-1550; 1674

LARGE, LUXURIOUS, PROFESSIONALLY ILLUMINATED, ACTIVE USE AND ADAPTATION BY DOMINICAN NUNS

DESCRIPTION: 67 folios on parchment, complete, twelve large historiated initials and two full-page illuminated borders, borders slightly trimmed and rubbed, historiated initials rubbed, 16th- or 17th-century blind- and gold-tooled leather binding, rebacked with the spine laid down. Dimensions 225 x 158 mm.

Made for the Dominican nuns of the royal convent of St. Matthew in Rouen, this Processional is a fine example of the skill of




the artists working during the last flowering of medieval manuscript illumination in northern France. Larger and certainly more lavishly illuminated than most surviving Processionals, it is a valuable witness to the liturgy and music at this convent. Extensive revisions by the nuns themselves make this a multi-layered artifact that will repay further study. [TM 1031]
